Principal's Message

This Lenten season Father Andrew gave me, 'Trust' A Lenten program published by, Catholic Diocese of Wollongong. I was lucky enough to have a CD version so I can listen to it in the car or when convenient.

The program consists of the Gospel reading and



two reflections for each Sunday of Lent. I have been drawn back to a reflection provided by Sr Hilda Scott OSB for the second Sunday of Lent.

To take you back, the Gospel reading for that week was Luke 9:28-36, The Transfiguration.

28 About eight days after Jesus said this, he took Peter, John and James with him and went up onto a mountain to pray. 29 As he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became as bright as a flash of lightning. 30 Two men, Moses and Elijah, appeared in glorious splendor, talking with Jesus. 31 They spoke about his departure,[a] which he was about to bring to fulfillment at Jerusalem. 32 Peter and his companions were very sleepy, but when they became fully awake, they saw his glory and the two men standing with him. 33 As the men were leaving Jesus, Peter said to him, "Master, it is good for us to be here. Let us put up three shelters—one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah." (He did not know what he was saying.)

34 While he was speaking, a cloud appeared and covered them, and they were afraid as they entered the cloud. 35 A voice came from the cloud, saying, "This is my Son, whom I have chosen;

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listen to him." 36 When the voice had spoken, they found that Jesus was alone. The disciples kept this to themselves and did not tell anyone at that time what they had seen.

The Son of God came to earth in the form of a man to be the servant of God and to gift mankind with the greatest gift ever given, eternal life. The transfiguration of Jesus Christ was a visible sign in the presence of reliable witnesses, the apostles, of the reality of the power of God and the glory, which is Christ Jesus.

Sr Hilda talks about love. 'Love usually reveals things to us that escapes others.' This quote resonates deeply with me. We are called to see through individuals imperfections and failings and see the goodness in all. Love truly enables this to happen. Many of us have family and friends who use actions or words that hurt or offend us. Yet, many of us meet this challenge with love, we see past the imperfections and find the goodness in people.

God's glory is evident in all of us. It is our goodness, our love for others and oneself. How often is it that we judge and fail to see the love and glory of God in others? Our challenge is to accept people as they are, imperfect and love unconditionally. We too are a reality of God's glory!

Afternoon Dismissal

In recent weeks it has become apparent that there is a need to clarify the procedure for Kiss and Drop with the students who use this service. Student expectations are important to ensure that the area is safe and that students move quickly to cars. I met with the students last week to communicate expectations. We need to,

- 1. Sit in the designated area
- 2. Talk quietly. This is not an area for play
- 3. Pay attention and listen
- 4. Watch for our car

We would appreciate your support in ensuring your child is familiar with these expectations

Use of the kiss and drop gate to pick up children is not allowed. This means that parents should not be,

- 1. Waiting at the gate for their children
- 2. Entering the school via the gate
- 3. Leaving the school via the gate

The reasons for these restrictions are;

- 1. Safety for students getting into cars which is a priority for this area
- 2. Supervision of this area is clearly defined for staff and parents who try to break school expectations place the safety of others at risk
- 3. The need to restrict parking in Gardenia Grove so Kiss and Drop moves as quickly and safely as possible.

If your child leaves via the gate to go to the tennis courts then this is where they should be picked up. It should be noted that the tennis courts are unsupervised. Parking in Gardenia Grove is discouraged, however I cannot make parents follow this school expectation. I would say that if you park in this area there is a potential that you are placing the safety of others at risk.

These expectations were devised with representatives from Blacktown Council and CEDP's Road Safety Officer. The ongoing operation of the Kiss and Drop service is conditional on parents following these expectations.

Parents who challenge these expectations can expect to be confronted by staff who are trying to do their job. Such confrontations are unlikely should all parents adhere to the expectations. If you require clarification of these expectations contact the office.

Morning Arrival

A reminder to all parents if you arrive after the second bell, 9.00am your child must enter via the office. This needs to occur even if the school gates are open. The classroom rolls are taken as soon as students enter the learning space and your child could be marked as absent if they enter after the roll is done. This happens when students do not identify themselves as late to the teacher and just join in with learning activities. This results in inaccurate attendance records which means a text message will be sent to you seeking explanation for absence.

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Attendance

As of Wednesday St Bernadette's student attendance rate is 89.4%. This is just short of our goal, 90% overall student attendance.

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Sleep tips for children

As our term gets closer to its end, we start to notice student's attention, mood and attitude beginning to shift. Students are becoming more weary and it is not uncommon for students to complain of being "tired" and finding it difficult to remain on task. In a previous newsletter I raised the importance of healthy eating as an avenue to help improve some of these problems, but an equally important focus should be on student's sleep. Increasingly teachers hear stories from children about how they have stayed up late playing on iPads, mobile devices or gaming consoles and how this is now affecting them at school. This is not to suggest this is an issue for all families, but rather an opportunity to highlight the importance of stringent sleep routines for children to help them grow, develop and learn. The website from Health Direct has more to add;

'Sleep is vital for children's growth, learning and development. Having a good sleep every night makes your child happier, helps them to concentrate and remember things, and improves their behaviour.

How much sleep do children need?

The amount of sleep we need changes with age. Everyone is different, but as a guide, children need the following amounts of sleep every night:

- Ages 3 to 5: 10 to 13 hours
- Ages 6 to 13: 9 to 11 hours
- Ages 14 to 17: 8 to 10 hours

Getting enough sleep is vital for your child's physical health, brain function, emotional wellbeing, safety, and ability to function day to day. Not having enough sleep or not sleeping well can affect how children learn and lead to mood swings and behavioural problems.

Tips to help children sleep well

Getting enough sleep is as important for your child as healthy eating and exercising. Here are some tips to help your child fall asleep, stay asleep and get enough good quality sleep.

- Establish a sleep schedule: Make sure your child goes to bed early enough to get the sleep they need. Once you have set an appropriate bed time, stick to it even at the weekend.
- Establish a bedtime routine: Follow the same routine every day: bath or shower, change into pyjamas, brush teeth, read or spend quiet time in their bedroom, lights out and go to sleep.
- Help your child wind down: Busy children need some time to relax. Consider playing soft music or reading to them.
- Make sure the bedroom is suitable for sleep: Ensure the bedroom is dark and quiet. If your child is anxious or afraid at night, use a night light.
- Avoid stimulants: Make sure your child avoids tea, coffee, chocolate or sports drinks, especially in the afternoon.
- Turn off technology: Turning off computers, tablets and television 1 hour before bedtime should help your child sleep better.

Signs of sleep problems

If you establish good sleep habits and your child is still having trouble falling or staying asleep, they might have a sleep problem. You might notice behaviour problems, difficulty concentrating or they might seem tired during the day.

Signs of sleep problems include:

- sleepwalking
- wetting the bed
- night terrors
- teeth grinding
- snoring
- trouble breathing while asleep, or taking long pauses between breaths.

Some tips for home reading

• Establish a home reading routine. Read aloud with your children everyday. Ten minutes for each child around a book of his/her choice. If English is your second language, read in your home language. Talk about the illustrations and contribute where you can. Share your excitement for reading and this will be the model your child will adopt.



• The reader holds the book! There is a lot of power and control in the world of reading. The reader needs to have the power. During home reading time, turn off electronic devices and give each child ten minutes of your undivided attention.

• Before you read a book, set your child up for success. Reading is not a test! Reading time is only ten minutes so do some of the following: Keep the introduction short – one minute is enough. Talk about the illustrations and the title. Read the blurb and talk about the author, talk about any unusual words, read a page here and there as your child flicks through the book, discuss the characters.

 Find a reading time that works for your family. Limit the time and set the timer if reading in the past has always been difficult. It is better to have an enjoyable 10 minutes than a laborious 30 minutes where everyone is left feeling frustrated.

 At the end of the 10 minutes, ask questions that encourage discussion, for example: What was your favourite part? Tell me about the characters. What do you think will happen next? What did you think about that setting? What do like/ dislike about this book?

 Encourage your child to read independently. A bedside light is one of the best enticements for your child to read before going to sleep. After the 10 minutes of reading with you, the child can elect to continue reading independently.

• Visit the local library — make it a family ritual on a set day every week. Let your children select their books while you select books you are interested in reading.

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On Wednesday 20 March *The Super Pollinators* Incursion took place in the Library, for Stage 1 students. The Incursion ran for 2 hours and included a 30 minute presentation given by Abbie Mitchell from Kids Connecting Nature. www.kidsconnectingnature.com.au

Abbie says: "The Super Pollinators Incursion is a great support to gardening programs and class studies exploring habitat, lifecycles, pollination or minibeasts (including bees of course!). In it we discuss bee life cycles, their important pollinating roles, and threats to bees and also

showcase many of the 2000 native bee species we have in Australia. We also make a bee hotel suitable for about 24 bee species in the Sydney area. During the workshop the students have access to view over 100 preserved invertebrates under magnification and inspect models (large 'pat-able' bee, and large model of carpenter bee lifecycle), posters, UV viewer (how a bee sees flowers) and related bee items (a preserved stingless bee nest, pollen and nectar reserves and even bee poo!)"

At lunchtime, some students identified a *Blue-Banded Bee* in the Cuphea, which is a ground cover, growing outside the Canteen!

 Take a moment to look at your fingerprint. Experts say it is unique. You share it with no one who lives or has ever lived. Let it remind you that God wanted you, specifically you, to come into this world. And let it remind you that our loving God grieves for you, when you hurt, and misses you, specifically you, when you turn away.							
Let this week's Gospel dispel all the false views of God you may have heard. God is not angry or vengeful when you sin. God is not an accountant who tallies our sins against our good deeds or a cop who waits to punish us.							
Unfortunately, many people hold on to those images. Some pastors and teachers even teach them, often because they misunderstand Old Testament Scripture passages that seem to portray God as angry or vengeful.							
Jesus tried to dispel those images of God as he announced the beginning of God's Reign. "Rejoice", he said. God is running to greet you right now. Turn toward God and let God embrace you.							

Look at the lost son in the Gospel story this week. He basically had wished his father dead by asking for his inheritance. But when he returns because he has nowhere else to go, the father runs to him, gives him the family ring, clothes him in the best robe, and kills fattened calf (people ate meat rarely).

If you read the text closely, you see that the father doesn't even let his son complete the apology before ordering all this.

Lent is a time to come home. We all stray. We live in a world that often calls us away from God. But God knows each of us by our fingerprint, knows when we turn away, and still always stands waiting, scanning the horizon, maybe weeping, hoping to see us turn back, looking for a chance to run toward us and embrace us once again.

In what ways do you need to come home to God this Lent?
