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Principal's Message

In the last two weeks staff have been working hard to get learning 'back on the tracks'. I refer to the train that has been derailed and requires assistance to right itself. We have come back to normal schooling after the longest disruption to traditional education any of us have experienced. This has had some positive effects and also presents some challenges.

One of the Leadership Team's most vital rolls is to identify areas of practice that need attention and to respond through feedback and support. Our primary focus at the moment is to ensure learning continues to be delivered consistently in all learning spaces as per best practice.

It's a challenging time for teachers. They have been asked to return to normal teaching and learning conditions with limited notice after a long period of dramatic change. In this time teaching as we knew it was flipped! Added to this is the pressures of Term 2. At the end of this term half of the 2020 school year will be gone. Teachers need to assess individual student learning and next step learning to ensure key benchmarks are achieved. But, schooling has been interrupted! How can we assess against the same benchmarks?

As educators we are in significantly challenging times! Once again as Principal I am extremely thankful for the amazing professionals that work at St Bernadette's. We are blessed to have a team of highly skilled and dedicated staff!

This past week significant work has begun in the Adventure Playground. This has not been without disruption and challenges. One of the notable challenges has been moving the infants play area to the small grass section behind Stage 2 and the need to move trucks and equipment safely within the school. As always our community rises to the challenge. The students and staff have been adaptable taking up the changes positively!

Most of the heavy ground works have now finished and laying the new soft fall and synthetic grass has begun. We have been informed that weather permitting this work will finish next week. Our new playground promises to bring significant changes to the whole school community.

The Breakout Space behind the office area is also finished. New furniture and a sandpit have been added. This space will be available to students when we return to the Adventure Playground.

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<u>Reports</u>

In response to the changes to teaching and learning as a result of COVID-19, St Bernadette's, like most schools in the Parramatta Diocese, are adjusting how we assess student learning and report progress to families. The report provided to parents will look significantly different to what families are familiar with. The interruption to teaching and learning as a result of COVID -19 is unprecedented and as a consequence reports need to fairly reflect students efforts.

During the peak of disruption to learning students were encouraged to stay at home. Learning continued at home, or for some at school, with a focus on Religion, English and Mathematics. As such most students continued to consolidate and learn new skills whilst in isolation. Our simplified report will reflect these focus areas.

Teachers are writing comments for each of the focus areas that will identify;

- Areas that have been consolidated
- A next step learning area

In English teachers will comment on reading and writing. Whilst in Mathematics teachers will comment on Number and Working Mathematically, which includes most of the other content strands. Teachers will also provide a comment for Religious Education.

Reports will also contain a small amount of attributes for which teachers will select either, Consistently, Generally or Rarely. These reflect the student's attitude to learning. As a school we will report on five attributes;

- Completes assigned tasks at school
- Completes assigned tasks at home
- Presents work, digital and written, in an organised, neat and 'published' standard
- Uses digital devices and applications confidently to reflect their best learning.
- In Science, student has developed knowledge and understanding of the natural world.
- In Science, student has developed and applied skills in scientific inquiry.

The last two attributes directly relate to Science learning for which the school has dedicated teaching personnel who have continued to provide learning opportunities throughout the disruption to learning.

Distribution of reports will also significantly change. Last week we launched the Parent Portal. Parents will access their child's report via this portal. Reports will not be printed out unless parents indicate the need. Such parents are encouraged to contact the office. The role of the Parent Portal to communicate with parents will significantly increase as we move forward.

The significant differences to this report are that there will be no grades, limited reporting areas, limited attributes and no attendance data.

This Semester there will be no mandatory parent interviews. There has been a rich transfer of information between staff and families throughout this pandemic. However, if parents wish to have a conversation with teachers this is encouraged. Parents are encouraged to contact their child's teacher through the normal channels. Any meeting would occur via a phone conversation or Zoom meeting.

Message from Stage 1

Over the past two weeks during our Writing lessons, the children in Stage One have been learning about Persuasive writing. Students listened to the story 'Eat Your Peas' by Kes Gray, as the springboard to write their Persuasive text. Their goal was to convince the character in the story, Daisy, to eat her vegetables. Our students enjoyed sharing their ideas with each other and were able to give reasons to support their point of view during the planning stage. The children followed a writing process which started off with them planning their ideas and then writing a draft copy. Throughout the week, the children learnt about the importance of word choice in

persuasive texts. Many started to apply this understanding when it came to revising and editing their written work by adding a range of

high modalities to really convince the reader about the benefits of eating vegetables! At the end of the week, students published their work and then shared it with the teachers!

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Message from Stage 2

Over the past fortnight Stage 2 have been learning about all the different types of Persuasive Devices that they can use in their Writing. Persuasive language is used for many reasons, for example, to help to sell products or services, or to convince

people to accept a view or idea. Each day they had







learnt about a new Persuasive device and how that can be used to persuade their reader to agree with their views on a particular topic.

Message from Stage 3

In Mathematics, Stage 3 have been focusing on how the math skills we are learning can be transferred to real life situations. When learning about angles, students created pieces of furniture for a doll house using angles to measure and construct their furniture. We had tables, chairs and beds constructed using different types of angles. In week 6 we explored Two-dimensional space. During the week we

identified different types of triangles, how can shapes be transformed and how to find rotational symmetry. This gave us the skills to create a wallpaper design that had these elements within it. This week students have been given the challenge to design and

construct a toy that uses the elements of three-dimensional space. Students began by creating a 2D plan and started constructing their toy using only three-dimensional object nets.
